#### PROGRAM NOTES – PCO CONCERT, MARCH 15, 2024



Gustav Mahler was an Austrian composer and conductor, and stands as one of the most influential figures in late-Romantic music. His career was marked by a relentless pursuit of emotional depth and philosophical expression, often exploring the human experience and the mysteries of existence. Best known in his lifetime as a conductor (he directed the Vienna Court Orchestra for 10 years), his music was neglected until the 1950s. These days, Mahler's compositions, notably his 10 symphonies scored for vast orchestral forces, are frequently performed.

Mahler's Fifth Symphony, composed in 1901-1902, is a monumental work in five movements that reflects the composer's personal struggles and triumphs. We hear its fourth movement, the famous *Adagietto*, perhaps Mahler's best known single work, written as a love song to his wife Alma. The large orchestral forces in the rest of the symphony are set aside, leaving only the string section and gentle arpeggios from the harp to create an atmosphere of profound introspection and emotional richness.

Allan Gordon Bell is a Canadian contemporary classical composer. Born in Calgary, Alberta, Bell received a Master of Music degree from the University of Alberta where he studied with Violet Archer, Malcolm Forsyth, and Manus Sasonkin, after completing undergraduate studies in philosophy. He also did advanced studies in composition at the Banff Centre for the Arts where his teachers were Jean Coulthard, Bruce Mather, and Oskar Morawetz. He has created works for solo instruments, chamber ensembles, orchestra, band, and electroacoustic media. He is a professor of composition and music theory at the University of Calgary.



The Concerto for Percussion and Orchestra was commissioned in 1984 by the Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra, and written to display one soloist performing on a large number of percussion instruments, fifteen in all. It was conceived as a celebration of melody, of color, of musical intelligence, and of exuberant good humor. The first movement, Serenely, is stately and lyrical. The second movement, With Primitive Aggressiveness, has three main sections: an introduction of the themes, on drums and marimba, followed by the soloist moving through the history of percussion, from rocks and sticks to drums, and a third section featuring a return of the earlier themes, with "no drum left unstruck."



Amy Beach was an American composer and pianist, widely recognized as the first successful American female composer of large-scale art music. Born in New Hampshire, Beach showed prodigious musical talent and gained acclaim for works in several genres, including piano, chamber music, choral works, and symphonic pieces. Her compositions often blended Romantic and impressionistic elements, showcasing her technical skill and emotional depth. Despite societal norms and challenges faced by female composers during her time, Beach left a lasting impact on American music. Bal Masqué (Masked Ball) is an early work, dating from 1904, originally for solo piano and later orchestrated by the composer. It unfolds with

intricate rhythms, melodic inventiveness, and a delightful sense of whimsy.

Franz Joseph Haydn was an Austrian composer of the Classical period. His contributions to musical form have led him to be called "Father of the Symphony" – he wrote 104 in all. Haydn spent much of his career as a court musician for the wealthy Esterházy family. In his later years he twice visited London, and his music dominated the concert scene there. On his second visit, he composed his last 6 symphonies (Nos. 99-104). Tonight we hear *Symphony No. 103 "Drumroll"* from the winter of 1794-95. Scored for what was then a very large orchestra of 60 players, it was an immediate success. After a slow and sombre introduction, it enters the standard four-movement form that Haydn himself helped define. And the nickname? Well, as you will hear, it needs no explanation!







About tonight's soloist: A native of Jackson, Tennessee, Torrance Buntyn Jr. began his percussion studies at age ten and won many awards through numerous Tennessee Honor Bands. In 2018, he received outstanding recognition for performing in the Tennessee Bandmasters Association's Honor Recital in Nashville. He also performed with the Jackson Symphony Youth Orchestra as principal timpanist.

Torrance is an alumnus of an HBCU (Historically Black College/University), Tennessee State University, Nashville, TN. He studied under Dr. Derrick Greene and Dr. Sean Daniels and received a Bachelor of Science in Music Education in 2022. While there, he performed in the two-time Grammy winning Aristocrat of Bands and toured with the TSU Wind Ensemble as principal percussionist. He has participated and performed in numerous seminars and festivals across the country.

Torrance is a May 2024 candidate for a Masters of Music degree in Percussion Performance at Southern Methodist University-Meadows School of the Arts, University Park, TX, where he studies with George Nickson (principal percussionist, Dallas Symphony Orchestra) and Brian Jones (Principal Timpanist, Dallas Symphony Orchestra). In Dallas, Torrance serves as freelance percussionist, percussion teacher, and extra percussionist for the New Philharmonic of Irving.

Torrance is currently a Protégé in the Mentorship Program of the Alliance of Black Orchestral Percussionists (ABOP) <a href="https://www.abop.us/">https://www.abop.us/</a>. The Program provides training and support to Black percussionists seeking a career in symphonic percussion. He is mentored by Douglas Cardwell (Former Timpanist of New Mexico Philharmonic) and Raynor Carroll (Retired Principal Percussionist of Los Angeles Philharmonic, and CEO and Founder of ABOP).

Pasadena Community Orchestra is thrilled to be in a community parternership with ABOP (since 2022), providing young Black percussionists, like Torrance, the opportunity to perform and grow as artists and musicians on our concert stage.
